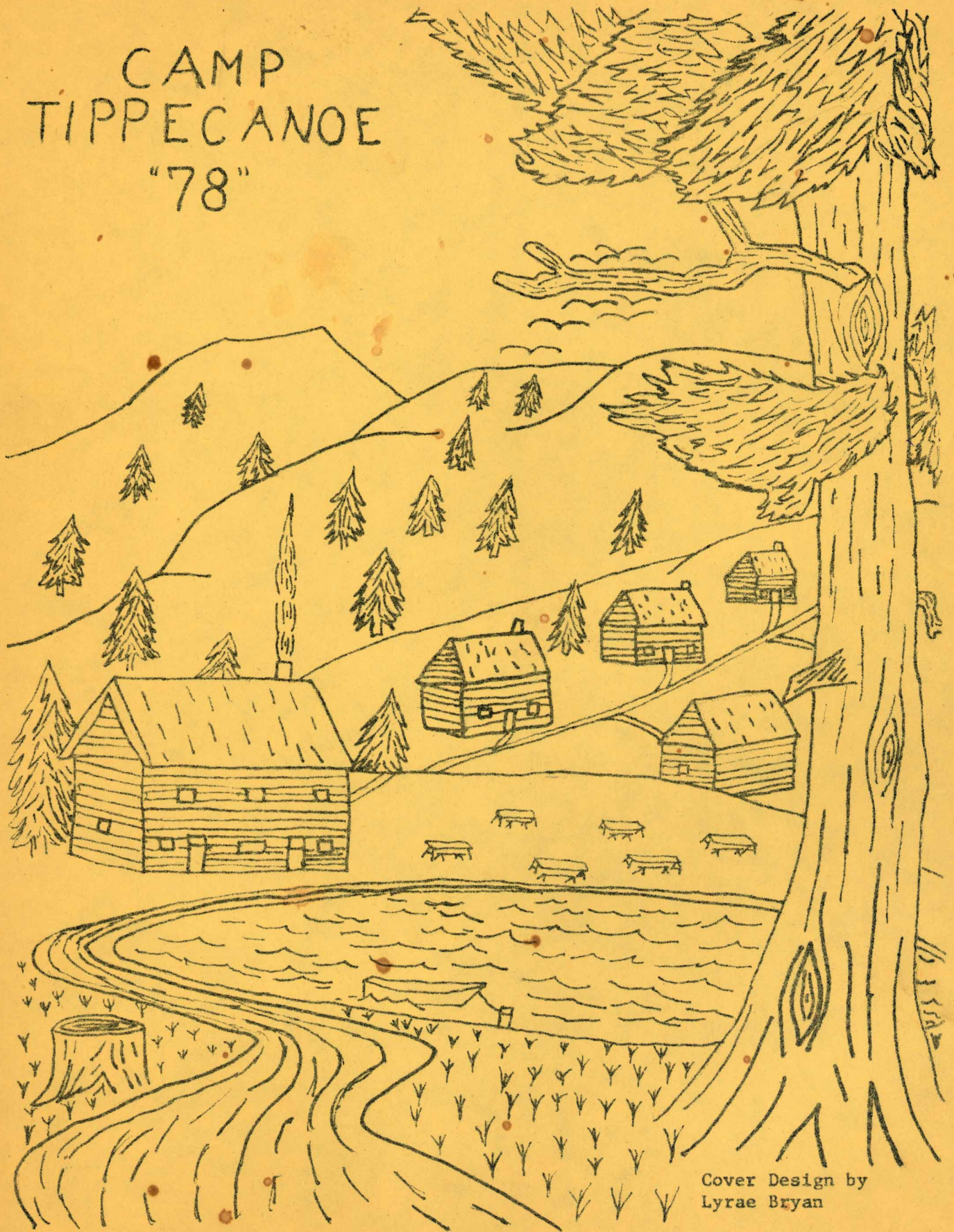

Dear Students,

Yours is the nineteenth class of intermediate students who have had the opportunity to take part in an outdoor education program. We are sure that you will find this to be an experience from which you can learn much as well as have an enjoyable time associating with classmates from your school and another school.

This three day program is intended as an extension of the subjects which you are studying in school. Most of the areas studied will be science related; however, you will find many practical applications of reading, writing, English, social studies, arithmetic, health, music and art emphasized also. We hope that you will return from this experience with a deeper understanding of how all areas of life are dependent upon the conservation of our natural resources. Another hope is that you will have learned to know the out-of-doors as an enjoyable place to spend many leisure hours.

Your teachers and principals have been working hard in order that this outdoor education experience will be as meaningful as possible. Many other persons have also contributed their time and efforts to making this a successful venture. Please show each one that you appreciate their contribution to this learning experience by giving them your attention and cooperation.

Again, yours is the nineteenth class of sixth grade students who will be afforded three (3) days of Resident Outdoor Education Experiences. This unique educational experience is only the beginning of educating for "environmental awareness". An awareness that has become increasingly tied to man's ability to provide a quality existence on our planet for this and future generations.

In this isolated unspoiled wilderness, outdoor education becomes an extension of the classroom. It is an outdoor laboratory where students may experiment and work directly with objects and ideas suited to it. A major point of emphasis is correlating classroom activities with camp experiences and again with classroom work following the outdoor program.

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CAMP INFORMATION

CAMP NAME - Camp Tippecanoe - Canton Y.M.C.A.

LOCATION - Clendening Lake - Follow State Route 800 to the north edge of Tippecanoe. (Do not go through Tippecanoe.) Turn left and follow blacktop road approximately 2.4 miles to first road on the right. Follow this gravel road to new camp road on right a distance of about 1.6 miles. After leaving Route 800, at each turn onto another road, there will be a sign indicating the direction into Camp Tippecanoe.

CAMP TELEPHONE - Uhrichsville (614) - 922-0679

LIVING QUARTERS - Cabins housing fourteen students and a counselor are grouped in two units, one for girls and one for boys. Each unit has its own toilet facilities with hot water.

CAMP STAFF - All activities will be under the direct supervision of professional staff members of the Dover Public Schools.

MEDICAL CARE - A registered nurse will accompany the group during each camping period. In case of accident or serious illness, parents will be notified immediately.

MAIN LODGE - Meals are eaten here. A fine staff of cooks prepare food which is eaten family style at tables seating eight. Students will set tables, serve the food, and clean up following the meal.

CLOTHING AND EQUIPMENT

It is hoped that the articles suggested here will not have to be purchased because of this school activity.

CLOTHING - Suitable clothes for cold or rainy weather are essential to learning. Old comfortable clothes are much more desirable than new clothing.

Campers will be carrying their own luggage from the parking area to the cabins and back again. The distance is about two blocks and the hill is steep. Therefore, they should bring the essentials; but very few, if any, extras.

GUIDELINES FOR CAMPERS

1. Students must always stay with the group to which they are assigned.
 - a. At meal time you will be seated at assigned tables.
 - b. Class assignments will be made at camp. Listen each day carefully for instructions.
 - c. You will be permitted to choose the recreation activity you wish to take part in, but once this choice is made you cannot change on that day.
 - d. On hikes and other activities a reasonable pace will be set so that all can keep up. No one should be far ahead or straggling far behind.
2. All activities will be under the supervision of a teacher or counselor.
 - a. Groups engaged in hiking, fishing, or other activities must have a teacher in charge.
 - b. All teachers and counselors at camp are persons in authority. Their requests should be respected even though they may not be your cabin counselor or classroom teacher.
3. The Canton Y.M.C.A. has made this camp available to us for this outdoor education program. We will want to leave it in as good condition as we found it.
 - a. Cabins should be cleaned each morning and a good final cleaning should take place when we leave.
 - b. Damaging camp property in **any** way is a thoughtless thing to do. Do not write on walls or in any other way mar or destroy any camp equipment.
 - c. Wild flowers, trees, animal homes, and other beauties of nature should not be disturbed. Many groups will use this camp each year and will wish to enjoy these just as you have.
 - d. Do not throw paper and other trash about the camp grounds. Containers are available for them. One of our last duties at camp will be to pick up all this sort of material.

GUIDELINES FOR CAMPERS, continued

4. Each camper should be concerned about his/her own health and the health of other campers.
 - a. Wash thoroughly before meals with hot water and soap.
 - b. Food should not be brought into cabins. It attracts rats, mice, and insects.
 - c. Any illness or injury should be reported immediately to your counselor or any other staff member.
5. In order for this experience to be an enjoyable one for all, we must be concerned about the responsibilities, rights, and privileges of each camper.
 - a. All talking should cease at "Lights Out". No talking in the morning before "Rise and Shine".
 - b. Boys are not permitted in girls' cabin area.
Girls are not permitted in the boys' cabin area.
 - c. There should be no horseplay in the cabins, during meals, during classes, or at any other time. Horseplay often leads to injury.
 - d. The Golden Rule should be the motto of each camper.

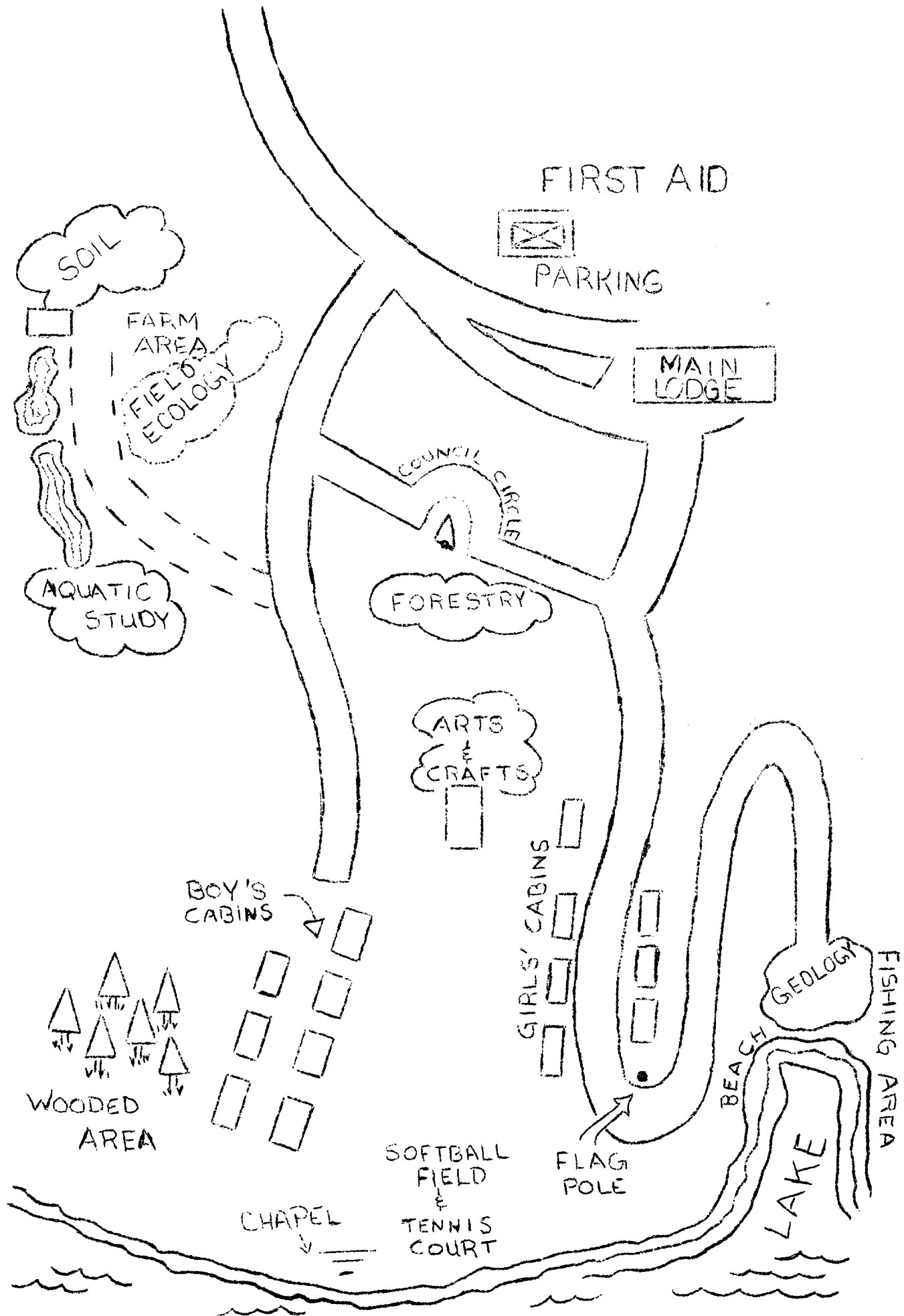

DINING ROOM PROCEDURES

GENERAL

1. Only students assigned set and serve duties will be permitted in dining area until the meal has been announced.
2. Loud talking, noise, or other boisterous actions will not be permitted in the dining area.
3. Students should remain standing behind their chairs until grace is offered.
4. Each cabin counselor will be in charge of two tables. Listen and follow their directions.
5. Proper table manners will be expected of everyone. "Please" and "Thank You" should be two words often heard.
6. There are two doors to the kitchen. The RIGHT DOOR is to go IN. The LEFT DOOR is to go OUT.
7. After the meal, only students on clean-up duties will be permitted to leave the table until after announcements have been made.

SET AND SERVE DUTIES

1. Wash and change to clean clothes.
2. Report to dining room 20 minutes before scheduled meal time.
3. Prepare dining room for the meal. A teacher will be in charge of the dining room. Follow his/her directions.
4. Only students assigned set and serve duties will bring food to the table. Refills will be available in limited quantities.

CLEAN-UP DUTIES

1. Students assigned clean-up duties will have set and serve duties at the following meal.
2. After everyone at a table has finished eating, the following procedures should be followed:
 - a. Take all good food back to kitchen.
 - b. Take all paper items and place in can marked "paper".
 - c. Scrape all plates into one container and put the scraps in large can marked "garbage".
 - d. Remove to kitchen in the following order: cups, plates, serving dishes.
 - e. Divide silverware at table, using a plate for each kind. There will be a container for each kind of silverware.
 - f. After table is cleared, take sponge and can of water and wipe off table.
 - g. Make any necessary advance preparations for next meal or activity.

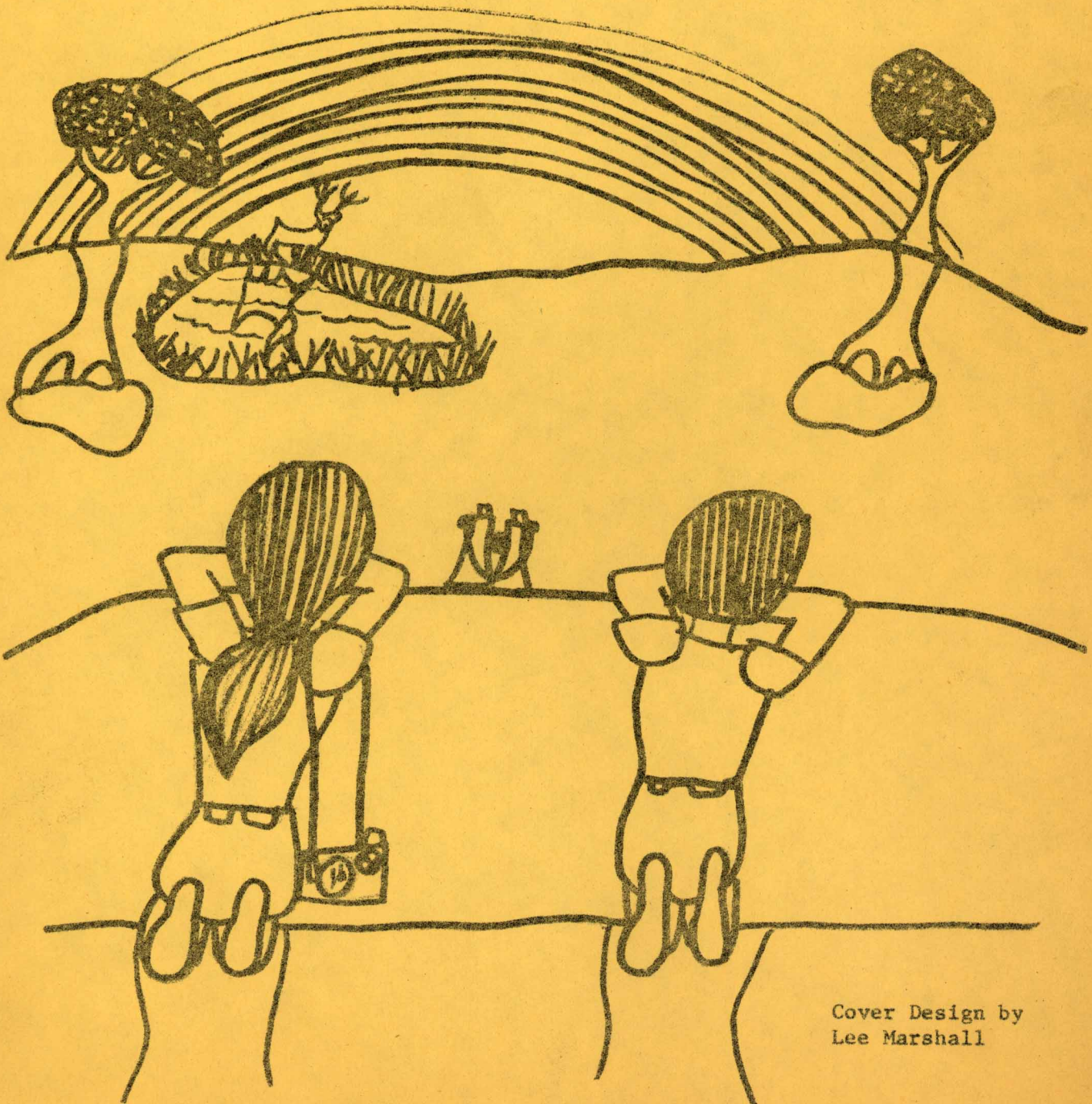
