Dover school board okays immediate 5% salary increase

I m m ed i a tely following Wednesday night's Dover board of education reorganizational meeting, newly-elected President Mrs. Isabel Moore called to order the first regular session for the 1971 term. Mrs. Moore

replaces C. Dale Swinderman. In the second session, the board across-the-board five per cent salary increases to teachers, non-certified employes and

aides.

In accepting the board president's post, Mrs. Moore, a board member four years, re-

leased the following statement:
"In voting the additional mil-

lage needed to operate our schools, the people of Dover expressed their belief in the school system and their desire for good education for their chil-

"We have a strong administrative and teaching staff. We have a quietly dynamic, aggressive and knowledgeable superintendent in Bill Kinneer. I am sure he and the other members of the board agree with me that 1971 is the year to mend our educational fences, correct our weaknesses and to diligently work toward our goal of giving the young people of Dover a sound, quality education — one

flexible enough to widen their opportunities of achieving a satisfying life."

Carl Pissocra was elected vice president and also named to the Buckeye Joint Vocational School Board. Atty. Richard Hanhart, who nominated Pissocra for the latter post, has served on the JVS board and offered Pissocra his assistance if

needed.

Eugene Dessecker and Pissocra agreed to continue as representatives on the athletic board at the request of Mrs.

clerk-treasurer George Aebersold's salary also was increased five per cent. He now will receive \$5775 as clerk-treasurer and \$3169 as supervisor for custodial, cafeteria and bus pro-

Members passed a resolution continuing the compensation of members for service on the board at \$20 a meeting or \$240 for the 12 regular meetings. No remuneration is received for special meetings or study ses-

ons.
The board's final matter of

business at the re-organization meeting was to approve Kinneer's temporary appropriation budget for 1971 in the amount of

\$2,487,000.

Kinneer pointed out that the 1970appropriation was \$2,194,000 and the actual expenditures \$2,246,000. The actual budget will be outlined in detail

at the Feb. 8 meeting.

increases for teachers, non-certified employes and aides, Kinneer explained at the second session that he had based the tentative 1971 appropriations on the expected increase and also had taken the increase into consideration when the board decided to ask for the 4.4-mill levy yoted at the December special

election.

"Since the increase is effective immediately and not retroactive, a teacher who started in September at \$6000 would get a \$300 raise meaning he would actually receive a \$166.65 increase for the remaining school year. A teacher making \$8000 would

get a \$400 raise meaning he would receive \$220 on his present teaching contract.

To employ Susan Mowry as clerk-custodian of the student activities accounts to replace the late Mrs. Wilma Gordon. Her base salary would be \$4054 with payment of \$2027 for the contract from Jan. 1 through June 30;

To appoint Dianne Ellis, George J. Polce and Diane Reed to the substitute teaching list;

To approve expenses for a number of teachers and administrators to professional meetings.
