

# Dover school staff complete

Purchase of a bus chassis, completion of the teaching staff and extra curricular assignments, employment of teacher aides, adult education classes and the need for a 4.4-mill levy were discussed at last night's Dover Board of education meeting.

A contract for a 1971 Ford, 66-passenger chassis was given to Potschner Ford on its bid of \$5385. The two other bids submitted were Weigand GMC Truck Sales \$5626, and International Truck Sales and Service \$5391.

A previous contract was let to Weinsz Motor but when that firm ceased operations, bids were re-advertised.

Extra-curricular assignments were approved for the following: Robert Wise, head track coach; Paul Mowery, junior high track coach; John Neighbor, baseball coach; Stan Zurowski, assistant; and Michael Rabes, golf coach.

Georganna Geltz and Sylvia Russell were appointed to the teaching staff on a half-time basis and Lowell Burrier, Dorrothea Grandstaff, A. C. Yost, Ruth Yost and Edith Lieser were named to the substitute teaching staff.

Educational aides appointed were: Jayne Brown, Kathleen Scherer, Clara Struhar, Joyce Dupler, Geraldine Newell, Marjorie Richmond, Virginia Gray, May LoPresti and Kathryn Studer.

The resignation of Ruth Lyster as secretary at South school was accepted and Nancy Gilmore was employed as a clerk-typist at that school.

Increases in salaries were approved for the following teachers who have completed additional training courses: Kenneth Hartz, Dianne Smith, Patricia Tucker, Clifford Schrader, Alma Cole, John Demuth and Josephine Gersdorff.

Board members approved a recommendation by Supt. Kinneer that persons teaching in the elementary grades and possessing elementary principal certificates be appointed intern principals to assume the principal's duties when he is absent. No additional financial stipend will be involved.

Kinneer pointed out that this would benefit the schools by

providing training and experience for the intern principals to enter the field of elementary administration.

It was reported that the Joint Vocational School levy would be between 2.9 and 2.95 mills with further information to be made available at a meeting tonight in Newcomerstown.

The board expressed its appreciation to General Electric Co. for permission to park buses belonging to Dover schools at the plant. Security guards will be provided by the plant.

Although no action was taken, a discussion was held on the overcrowded conditions at South school. Further discussion will be held to determine the best method of relieving the situation.

On the recommendation of Paul Koval, director of curriculum, instructional services and adult evening classes, Clyde Pence, coordinator of the Diversified Cooperative Training program, was designated as assistant in the adult school program.

It was agreed by the board the appointment would release time for Koval to apply to a closer liaison with the Ohio Department of Education in the development and expansion of the adult program.

Board members Mrs. Isabel Moore and Richard Hanhart recommended that the adult classes be expanded to a more meaningful program and some thought be given to a cooperative program between Dover and New Philadelphia schools.

Written reports received by the board included one by Mrs. Moore on an Ohio School Board meeting she attended, the August athletic council meeting, an adult education brochure, an elementary school newsletter prepared by Donna Moore and a letter from the Dover Education Assn. promising its full support of the 4.4 mill levy which will be on the November ballot.

Next board meeting will be Oct. 12 at 7:45.
