Dover board budgets \$2,895,000 for '73 operations

On the recommendation of Supt. Bill Kinneer, the Dover board of education, at a meeting Monday night, accepted a preliminary 1973 general fund budget of \$2,895,000.

The proposed budget, which must be submitted to the countv auditor by July 20, is \$3258 higher than the estimated 1972 budget of \$2,891,742 and \$329.517 more than actual 1971

expenditures of \$2,565,483.

More than half of the budget, or \$1,912,037, will be spent for teacher salaries."

The next-largest expenditure is for such "hidden" expenses as teacher and employes' retirement, workmen's compensation, tuition to other districts, auditor and treasurer fees, election expenses and similar assess-

Other sizable estimated espenditures include \$214,400 for operation of the school plant, \$126,200 for administration. \$76,600 for transportation and \$66,000 for librarians.

In presenting the estimated budget. Kinneer said he could not see any undue financial concern for the 1973 year.
