Action taken on OSU survey calling for merger with Dover School District

Phila board says: 'Let's vote!'

Official silence on an Ohio State University survey team report recommending the administrative merger of Dover and New Philadelphia school districts was broken Monday night by the New Philadelphia board of education.

It unanimously approved a resolution requesting that the merger question be placed before the voters of the New Philadelphia and Dover school districts at the earliest possible date.

New Philadelphia's resolution points out that the "survey team recommended a jointure . . . to better utilize the total resources of the two communities in order to provide ex-

panded and improved educational opportunities for all the children of the two districts."

The action means the next move is up to the Dover board which must approve a similar resolution for the issue to be placed on the ballot.

"For many years — at least since I have been on the board — we have conducted discussions that would have led to this type of thing," board President Earl Olmstead commented.

He termed the Ohio State survey an "impartial eye" that had been fair to both parties and said, "We certainly hope the Dover board would look with favor upon the resolution."

Vice President Mike Rapport commented that "some

of our earlier considerations were fortified by the OSU re-

Dover's board of education, which also met Monday night, did not discuss the New Philadelphia board action or the OSU report. See Page A-11 for the Dover story.

Supt. Dr. Philip Tieman called the resolution "an appropriate expression of our opinion." Board member Mart Sand added that the two school districts would get the benefit of the survey whether the suggested merger takes place or not.

The two boards of education contracted for the survey on March 12, 1969, at a cost of \$5000 each payable over two

years. An informal report was released at a joint board meeting July 21 and the complete 226-page report was made available in late September.

Last night's action was the first official expression since that time.

Also examined by the board was the latest in a series of proposals for a Buckeye Joint Vocational School District.

The new plan, discussed by superintendents last Saturday, will be up for official adoption when the Buckeye JVS board meets Friday, probably in the Tuscarawas County board of education office.
