Armstrong scholarship fund announced

The annual Dover-New Philadelphia football game not only spotlights on-the-field stars, but those who have worked long hours behind the scenes to make the overall rivalry a success.

There are a number of highlights and special happenings that set the game apart from all the rest.

During pre-game ceremonies, Dover Board of Education president Isabel Moore announced the establishment of a Tom Armstrong Sr. Memorial Scholarship Award in honor of the former longtime Dover High teacher and football coach who died last Aug. 10.

Mrs. Moore shared her thoughts of Armstrong who was an inspiration to the hundreds of students who knew, admired and loved him.

A plaque honoring Armstrong will be placed in the high school, according to Jennifer Fox, student council president, who accepted the plaque from Edward Hamsher, superintendent.

Although the award's criteria has not yet been established, a committee has been formed to set the guidelines.

Crater Stadium's field was dressed-up, sporting a bright look for the traditional football battle. The star-studded end zones boasted DHS and NPHS lettering. For the diamond jubilee game, a large number "75" centered the field. Around the numbers were the words, "Years of Football."

As the Dover football team an-

nounced before the game, more than 1100 red and white helium-filled balloons drifted into space after being uncovered in a large wagon. The Tornado Club was responsible for the spirit inducer.

The club also purchased new jerseys for members of the squad. Each jersey had the player's name on the back, in addition to Tornado and 75th anniversary patches on the respective sleeves. Players were given the shirts as keepsakes.

The 75th anniversary souvenir program featured color pictures of seniors and the head coaches from each school.

New Philadelphia High won the spirit ribbon contest, beating Dover High with a total figure of \$1648 collected. Dover students contributed \$751 toward their spirit ribbon cause.

Part of the proceeds from the NPHS contest go toward cash prizes given for various activities and events held during the week in conjunction with the game. The remainder is used by the student council throughout the year for student and teacher projects.

The Quaker freshman class received \$50 for having the longest spirit ribbon. Three students from each of the top four grades are selected at random and awarded cash prizes.

Cash prizes also went to winners in the float competition, held Thursday night at the New Philadelphia community pep rally.
