ASHLAND - The Dover Tornado hoys held off New Philadelphia in the final event to lock up their second straight Cardinal Conference track and field championship here Saturday.

In the girls' meet Ashland was first while Dover took third and New Philadelphia fourth.

Dover held a slim 64-61 lead entering the boys' mile relay finale, where the Tornado quartet of Greg Arbogast, John Feutz, John Craig and Dan Hurst took first in 3:35.7.

That gave Dover a total of 70 team points compared with 65 for the Quakers, who were second in the mile relay.

A New Philadelphia first and a Dover third in that event would have left the two teams tied for the top spot. Mansfield Madison was third with 56 points, Ashland fourth with 46 and Wooster fifth with 16.
