Barker, North relay take 3rds in state track

COLUMBUS — Athletes at the state track and field championships will always remember competing at Ohio Stadium, especially the heat.

Heat waves rippled off the football field during a sunny, 90-degree Saturday afternoon, the horseshoe stadium blocking out what little breeze blew across the Ohio State University campus. Only low humidity made it a tolerable day.

Runners ducked into the training room or the cool, damp corridor inside the stadium to escape the energy-draining sun. Bleachers along the backstretch were as popular for sun bathers as for fans watching the meet.

WATER PUMPERS and towels soaked in ice water awaited the runners at the finish line. OSU student trainers were busy carrying exhausted competitors off the track after the distance races.

"It felt like heat was blowing on you instead of wind," said Claymont junior Steve Barker, who placed third in the Class AA 800-meter run with a time of 1:57.02. "It was tough. My feet are on fire, too."

Barker was one of only five entrants from The Times-Reporter area to place in the top six during Saturday's running finals and conclusion of the field events.

It was a light day compared to Friday's session, when four area athletes claimed state championships: Claymont's Andy Pentecost in the 'AA' discus, Newcomerstown's Dave Bell in the 'A' pole vault, Malvern's Karen Larke in the 'A' high jump and West Holmes' Lisa Cline in the 'AA' shot put.

It appeared the sun had gotten the better of Barker, as it did most other area distance runners, when he dropped from fifth to a lagging eighth midway around the second lap of the 800.

HE WASN'T finished, however, charging hard the final 200 meters to take third place by a convincing margin.

"It was faster than I thought it would be," Barker said of the pace. "I just wanted to hang with the group so I could kick them at the end.

"I had the fourth-best (regional) time coming in," he explained. "I wanted to get one of those guys... and that's what I got. I hope to get first next year."

Tor Hill of Steubenville won the race in a meet-record time of 1:53.55. Last year, Barker finished 12th at the state meet.

Indian Valley North's 800 relay

team was fortunate enough to beat the afternoon sun. Jessie Metzger, Terry Benadum, Carmen Searcy and Becki Schoelles enjoyed a cool 9:45 a.m. starting time.

They responed with a thirdplace finish in the Class A event, clocking in at 1:47.04. Rockford Parkway was first in 1:46.52.

"I'VE NEVER been nervous until today... not in my whole life," said Schoelles, a senior, who anchored North's relay team and qualified for the state in four events for the second straight year.

"It was awesome," added Searcy. "We did what we knew we could do."

One runner who thought he could have done a little better was Dover's Bryan Miller, who placed fifth in the 'AA' 100 with a time of 11.18. Sandusky Perkin's Don Clark was first in 10.74.

"If I had gotten out of the blocks, I'd have done a lot better, explained Miller, who yanked his shoes off in disappointment after crossing the finish line. "I thought the wait (for the starter's gun) would be a little longer, but all of a sudden it went off.


"Next year, I know I'll get in the top three," he added. "I wanted fourth or better, but fifth isn't that far off."

In the 'AA' discus, Beth Manson of Sandy Valley added a fifth-place award to the third she earned in Friday's shot put. The senior threw 124-feet-1.
