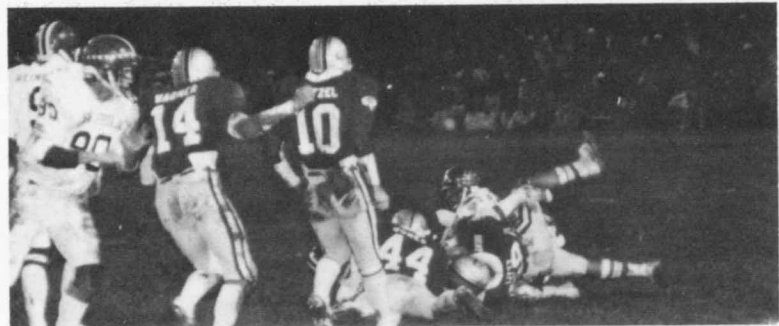

# DHS CROSS-COUNTRY

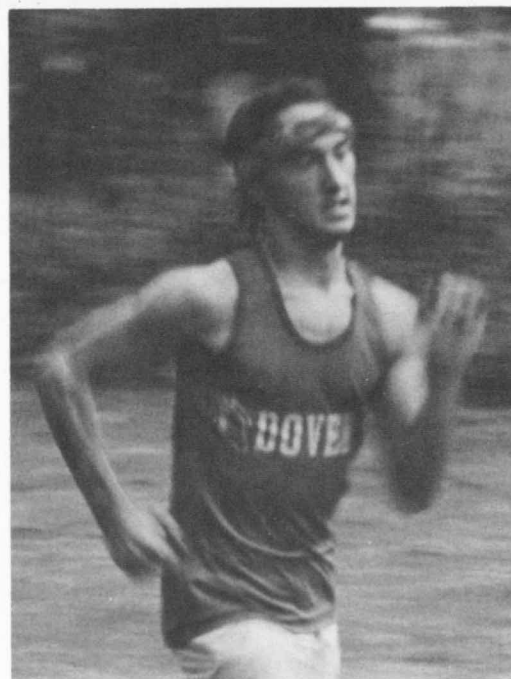

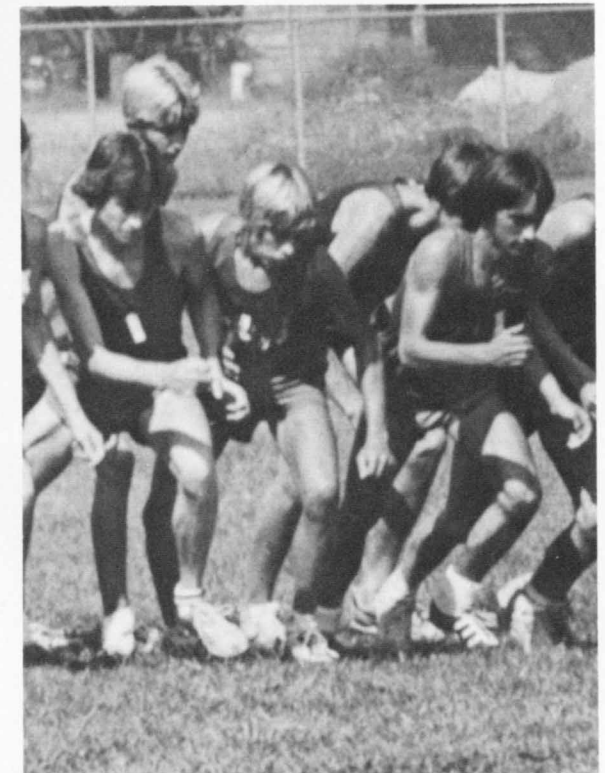

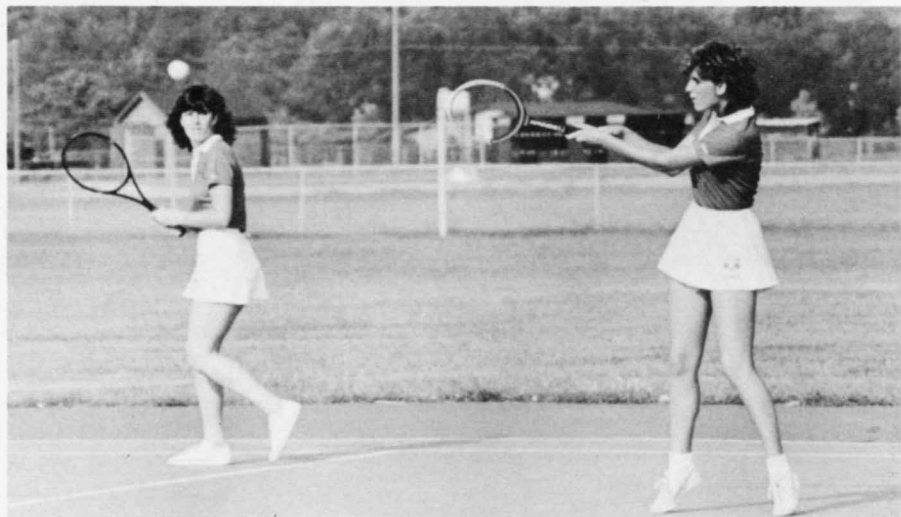


# ADVANTAGE DOVER

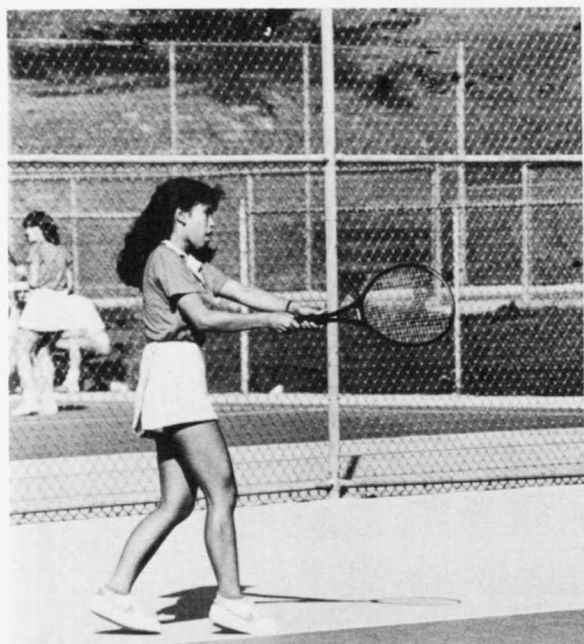

# Dover Basketball on the Upswing

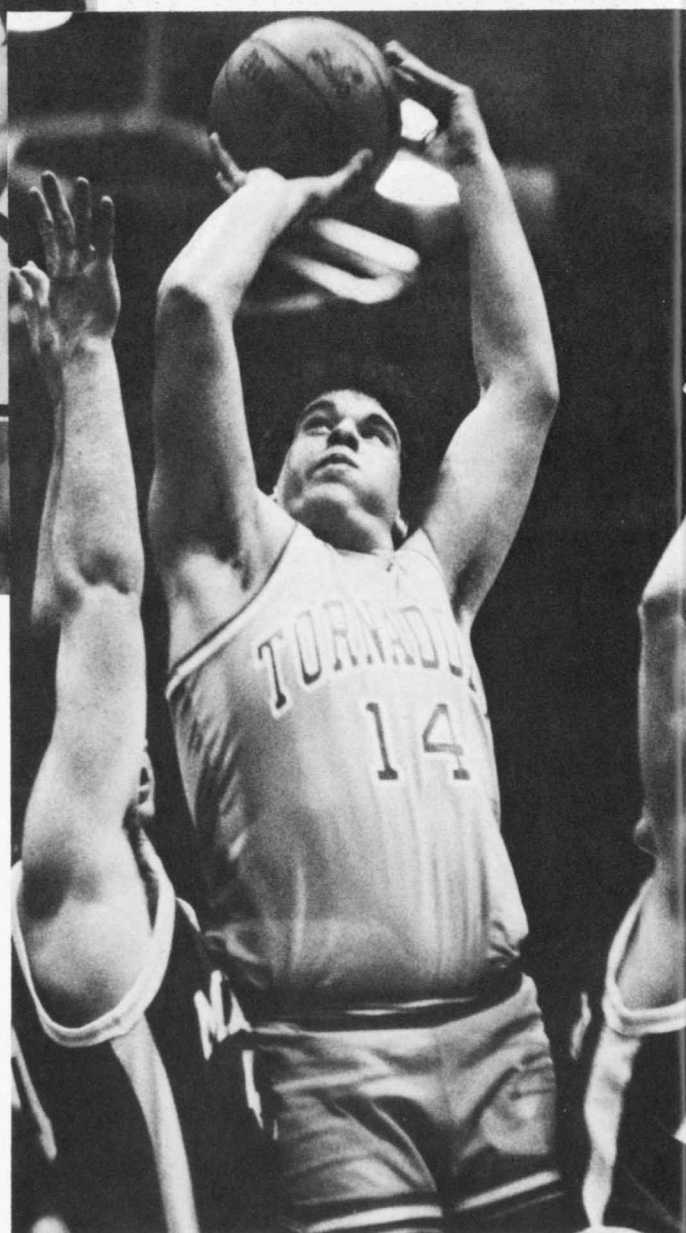
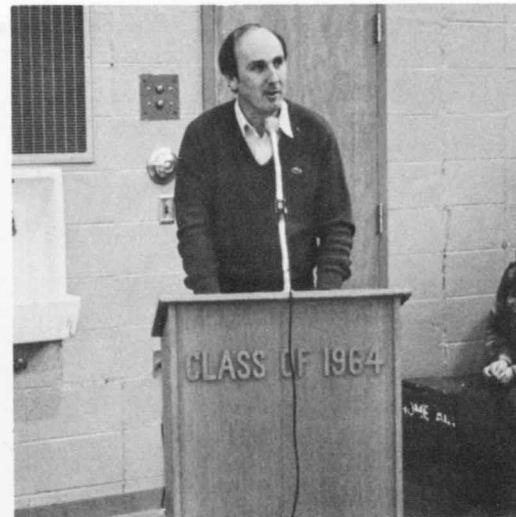
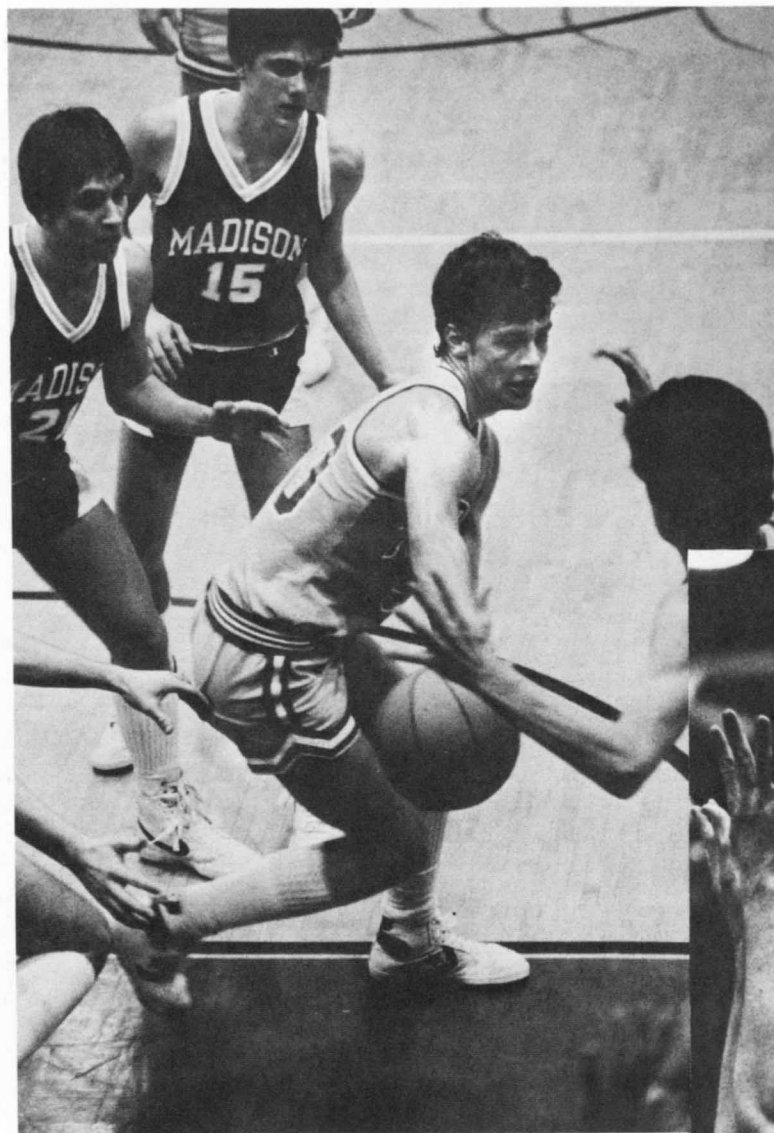

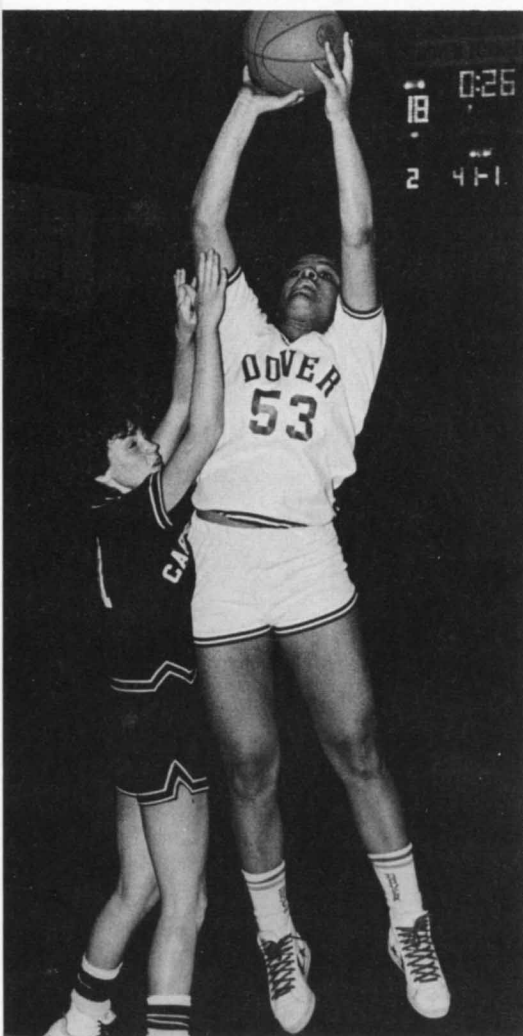


# “Lady Tornadoes”

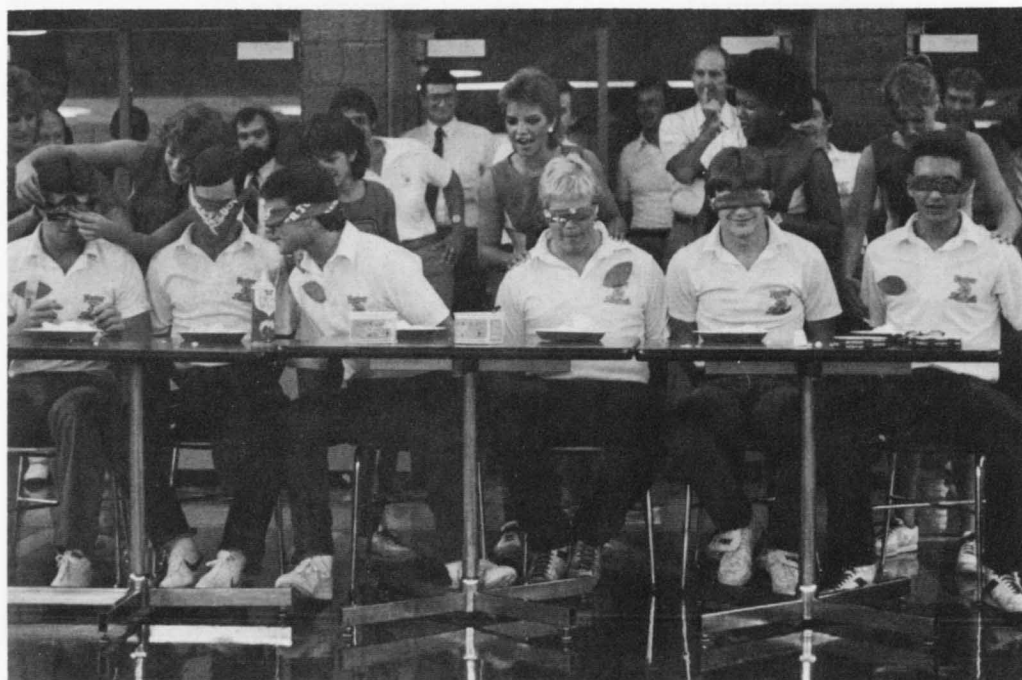

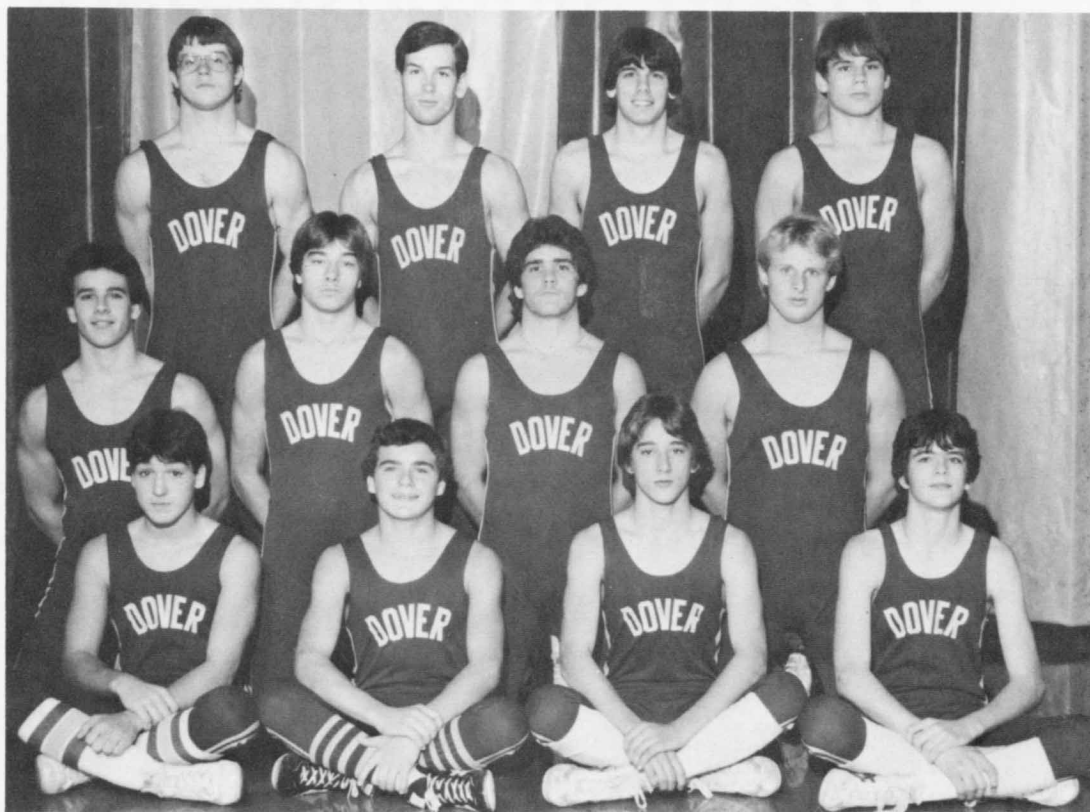

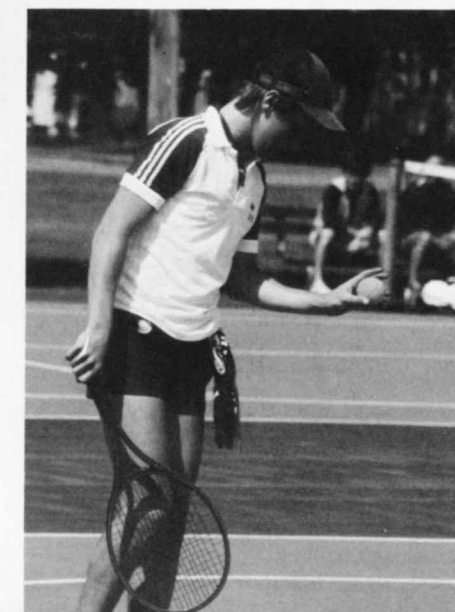

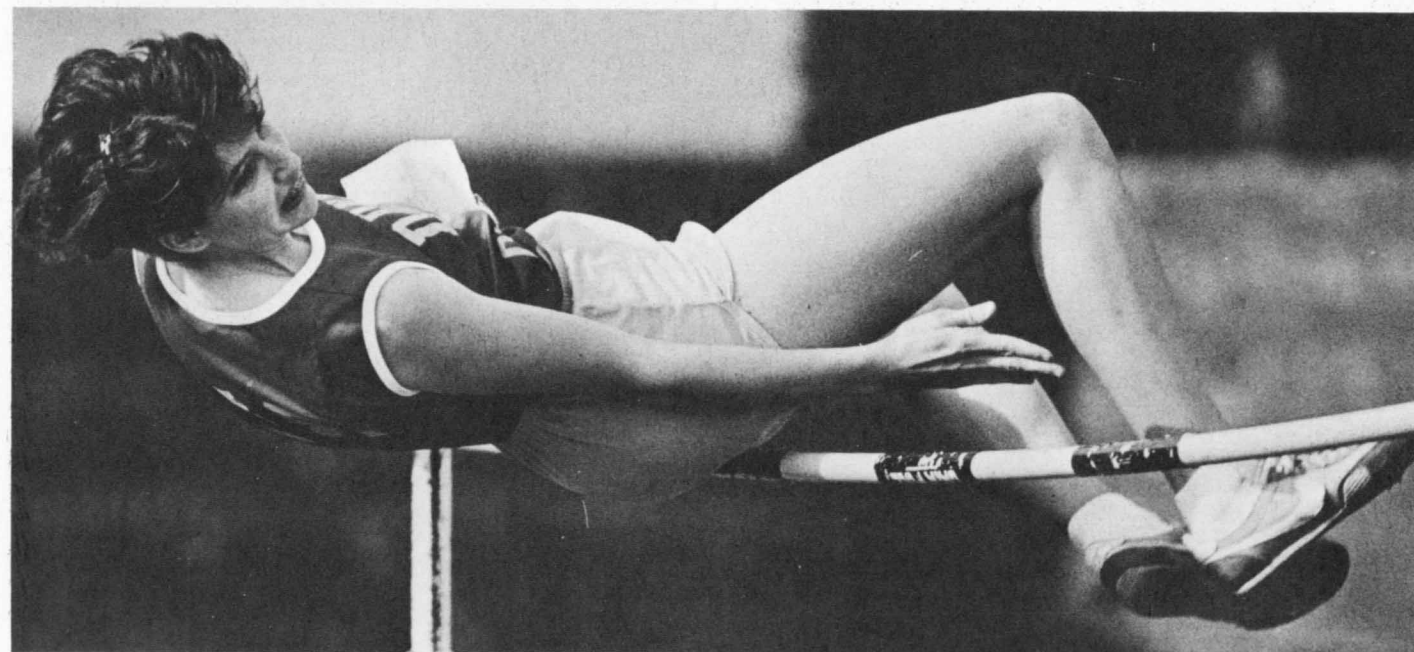
The 1984 edition of the girl's track team was the turning point in the program. We finished the year with 42 girls, 40 of whom will return next year.

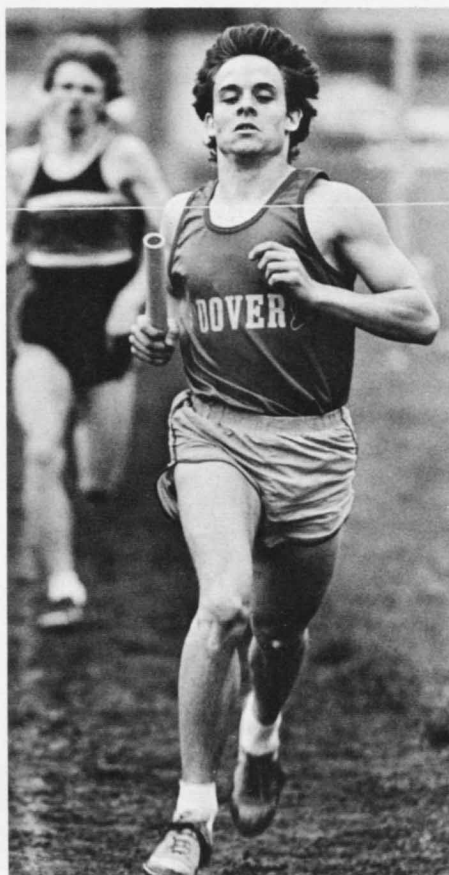

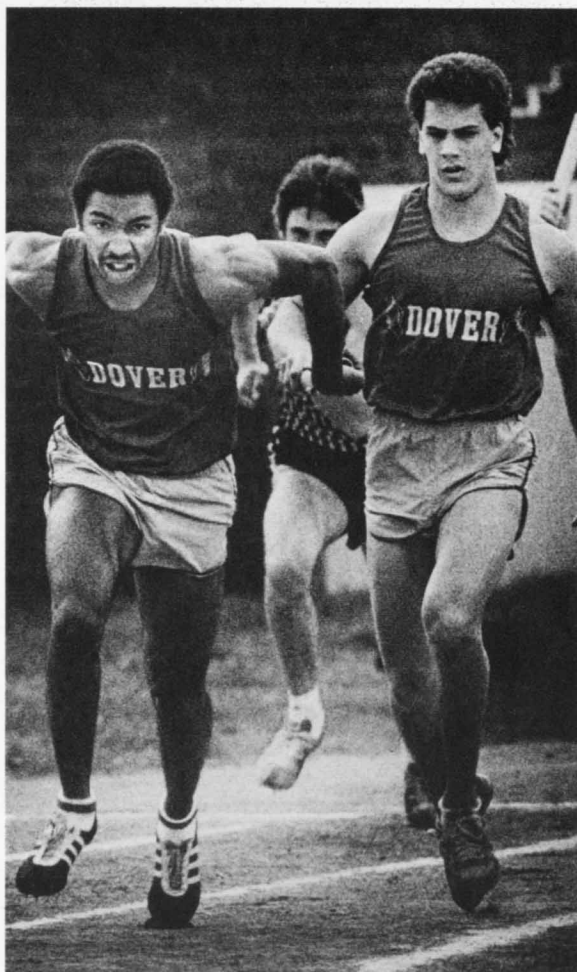
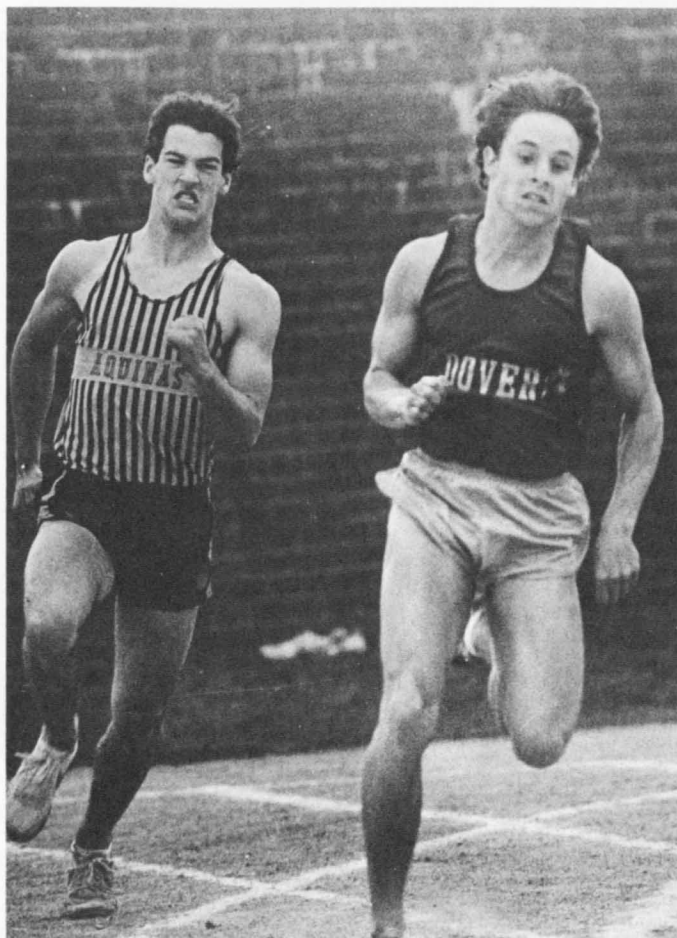
