## Dunbar Now Becomes a Superpower

DAYTON - With the closing of Roth High, athletes from that school have moved to Dunbar and will make the Wolverines a AAA superpower this season.

That means Phillip McCray (400), Jeff Early and Quinthy Brown (both hurdlers) and Dave Lawrence (long jump), all state meet scorers for Roth's AA champs last season, are back. Dunbar also picked up hurdler Mike Jackson from Wilbur Wright, another school which closed, giving the Wolverines much experience.

Patterson will battle Dunbar with long jumper-hurdler Soloman Branch, hurdler-half-miler Sylvester Mickler and sprinter Frankie Watts.

Randy Schmidt of Vandalia Butler has scored in the state high jump the last two years and is a fine low hurdler and decathlete. Lincoln Graves, Clayton Northmont, appears to be the class the distance group which includes Matt Trickett, Fairborn; Dave Ely, Greenville; Dan Butchko, Fairmont West and the Fairmont East duo of Eric Ogalsbee and Brian Guth. Groves was second in the state cross country meet and ran a 9:46 indoor two-mile this winter.

The ranks of quarter-milers is impressive. It includes Tom Little of Piqua, Eric Downey of Beavercreek and Arnold Bowie of Fairborn. The best the low hurdlers should be Dave Beechler of Centerville and one of the leading sprinters should be Xenia's Mark Walker.

In AA, Jefferson Township has a fine hurdler in Gus Hutchins who scored in both hurdles in last year's state meet. Teammate Raynard Gover hopes to improve on his 6-9 high jump.

Distance prospects are Jeff Reynolds of Middletown Madison, Ron Deaton of Casstown Miami East, Mike Dely of CJ

## Mansfield Relays Draws the Big Ones

MANSFIELD — Clinton Davis, Munhall (Pa.) Steel Valley's sensational sprinter, will head a star-studded cast of high school athletes when the 51st edition of the Mansfield Mehack Relays unfolds here April 15-16.

The smooth-striding Davis is considered the premier high school speedster in the United States and he will be competing against top dashmen from five states and Ontario, Canada on the super-fast, all-weather track at Malabar's Mehack Field.

Davis, a 17-year-old senior, first gained national attention this winter when he captured the 400-meter dash at New York's Millrose Games in 47.46 seconds. Davis has been clocked outdoors at 10.57 for 100 meters, 20.39 for 200 and 45.4 for 400.

He will be entered in three individual dash events here as well as running anchor for Steel Valley's 4 x 100-meter relay team.

Relays Director Doug Castle is expecting a field of more than 1,300 athletes to compete in this prestigious midwest meet. This will be the second attempt to hold the 51st Relays, since a rare, heavy April snowstorm forced cancellation of the event in 1982.

"Not being able to hold a meet in 1982 was a bitter pill to swallow, but we're going to come back with an even better show this year," said Castle.

Early entries include powerhouse Indiana teams Hammond High School, Gary Roosevelt and Gary Horace Mann.

Natty Crooks of Toronto (Ont.) West Park Secondary School will be taking dead aim at the Relays' high jump record of 6-11 $\frac{1}{4}$ . Crooks has already cleared 7-2.

Outstanding distance runner Todd Crosson from Connersville, Ind. (9:11.0 for two miles) is entered in the 3,000-meter run, which is one of four running events schedule for Friday afternoon. The pole vault is the only field event held the first day.

One of the Ohio threats in the 3,000 is expected to be Shawn Jackson of Columbus South, the Buckeye state's top indoor two-miler this season.

In 1981 the Relays attracted 1,355 participants from 172 (125 non-Ohio) high schools. Detroit (Mich.) Central nosed out Lancaster, 52-45, for the team championship.

## South's Shawn Jackson Emerges as Distance Threat

COLUMBUS — Shawn Jackson of Columbus South is for real. He's a premier distance runner. He's dedicated and he'll pay the price for success.

Jackson emerged as one of the leading AAA distance runners this winter when he climaxed his indoor schedule by winning the 1500 (4:13.7) and 3,000 meters (9:08.2) at the Central District meet late last month.

How good is Jackson?

"Very good," said Coach George Gilchrest who thought Jackson's best event was the 3,000 but now has a change of heart after Jackson's impressive metric mile victory.

"He's capable of better times and he'll get them if he stays healthy," said Gilchrest, in his 17th year as coach and eighth at South High.

Jackson was around last season but he ran into hard luck. "I developed shin splints and didn't make it to the state track finals," Jackson recalled. "I missed the state cross country finals because I had bronchitis."

Gilchrest says if Jackson stays healthy he'll do well because he wants to succeed.

Gilchrest believes his team has a shot at the state title, "but it will be an uphill struggle."

Gilchrest says his team has

never won a city title, coming in second once, and he thinks it might be second-best now because Northland appears to be the team to beat outdoors.

In addition to Jackson, other expected South headliners should be junior Don Reeves in sprints; senior Degory Randall in the 800 and Tony Minor and Frank Martin in the 400.

Central expects to be strong with hurdler Russell Turner and Kelvin Thomas in the 3200.

Linden McKinley has versatile Rodney Turner in the 400 and Mike McGuire in the 800; Mifflin has Ben Tyson in the low hur-

## Scott Owen has Impressive Credentials

Scott Owen, a distance ace from Toronto, returns to Eastern Ohio tracks this spring with the most impressive credentials.

Owen is the only returning runner to score in last year's state meet as he placed fourth in the AA 800-meter run with a PR 4:22.53.

During the regional qualifier at New Concord, the Red Knight athlete set an area record in the 800 with 1:57.4.

While Owen was the dominating individual at 800 and 1600 last season, the top 3200 and pole vaulters return to Eastern Ohio.

They are distance runner Ken Sokolowski of Martins Ferry, who timed 9:42.5 for 3200 and vaulter Joe Wells of Meadowbrook, who cleared 13-3. Sokolowski also had 4:32.22 for 1600.

While that trio should take dead aim on area standards this spring, others appear to be on the verge of gaining headlines. Included are the following, with best marks list for each event:

Sprinters Gary Murray of Steubenville (11.1) for 100, 22.4, 200; Chuck Allen of Martins Ferry (11.1, 22.6); junior Joe Vincent (11.1) and senior Melvin Jackson (11.3) of St. Clairsville;

and the Cadiz pair of Steve Dandridge (11.2, 22.6) and Dan Hawthorne (11.2). Paul Wallace of Steubenville time 11.2 and 22.7.

Middle distance ace Huey Smith of Steubenville (51.7 for 400, 2:00.1 for 800).

Toronto sophomore Doug Shevelow time 51.87 for 400 meters as a freshman.

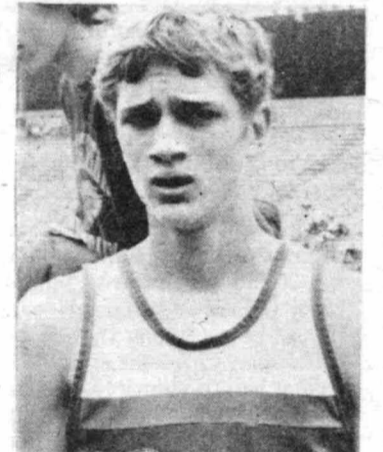

## INAUGURAL OWENS CLASSIC RATES OHIO FANS' ATTENTION

The inaugural Jesse Owens Track and Field Classic May 8th in Ohio Stadium should be embraced by track buffs around the state. An outstanding field has been assembled by Meet Director Ron Althoff for this Olympic-style meet where all events are finals.

Heading the impressive cast is the No. 1 ranked long jumper and sprinter in the world, Carl Lewis of the University of Houston.

There are seven 18-footers in an outstanding pole vault field that includes the current world outdoor record holder, Brad Pursley of Abilene Christian, the indoor record holder Billy Olson, Earl Bell, Larry Jessee and Jeff Buckingham.

Lewis won't be expected to compete in both events, preferring to long jump, according to Althoff, but the presence of this extraordinary person should bring in the crowd.

Ohio State officials need a crowd of 20,000 to break even. The fact the meet is on Sunday afternoon when fans have free time should help the meet, plus the lure of an outstanding field should produce a good turnout.

A lot of fans making this a Buckeye weekend, attending the OSU Spring Game Saturday, May 7 and staying over for the Owens Classic the next day.

Althoff has many other world class athletes coming. He also is inviting some of Ohio's top high schools for the prep division which start activities at 1 p.m., followed by the invitational events at 3:45.

It all adds up to a big day so plan to attend.

Veteran track coach Frank H. Longstreth of Western Reserve Academy is beaming these days. "After 35 years we finally have one of the best new track facilities in the area," Longstreth says. May 7 will be dedication of the Frank Longstreth Track in Hudson. . . . For the first time, Akron city schools have a new 8-lane, all-weather track. It's on Omni and it's at Ellet Stadium. . . The Midwest Meet of Champions will be June 11 at 1:30 p.m. in Fort Wayne at Northrup High's Spuller Stadium. The all-star meet will have 22 events with six for girls. Ohio should have another contending team.

## Cortland Lakeview has State Title Aspirations

YOUNGSTOWN —Although several schools have made strong bids for a state track title in the past 10 years, Cortland Lakeview is the last Youngstown area school to win the coveted prize.

Lakeview won the Class A crown in 1970 when Ohio just had two divisions. However, Leetonia could challenge for the small school crown if the Bears can come up with several other scorers to go with a pair of fine sprinters and a crack 400 relay team.

The top individual for the Bears is Arnold Brooks, who won the state 200 last year as a sophomore in 22.94. He was nipped in the 100 finals, 11.24 to 11.23. Arnold also ran anchor on the 400 relay unit which was second in 44.08. All four runners from the team return, including Arnold's younger brother Kurtis.

Kurtis ran the 100 in 11.5 last year, while another member of the relay, Shawn Sevenich, went 19-7/4 in the long jump.

Last year was a bad season in state competition for Class AAA spikers. This could change this year with a number of top boys back, including high jumpers Jim Gilmore of Warren Western Reserve and Matt Ospeck of Salem, who made it to the state after going 6-8. Gilmore, an all-Ohio in basketball, cleared 6-5 1/2 a year ago.

One of the top AAA sprinters should be Warren Howland's Jeff Walker (11.2 and 51.0 for the 400).

Austintown Fitch has two good sophomore distance runners in Steve Haire and Mike McKenna. Haire qualified for the Knights of Columbus indoor meet in the mile at 4:36.5. The Falcons have a good shot putter in Steve Dorbish, 52-10 1/2 last spring who improved to 53-5 3/4 during the recent indoor season.

Expected to challenge the Fitch duo as the top distance runner in the area is John Santiago of East, 4:44 in the 1600 and 10:42 in the 3200 a year ago.

Although they may be a year away, Warren JFK could move past Rayen as the top AA school here. Veteran coach Tony Buttar, starting his 23rd season as head mentor, has a number of good

junior prospects, including weightman Tom Leichtliter, sprinter Jim Coates and distance runner Anthony Rossi.

Leichtliter is the younger brother of Jim Leichtliter, who won the Class A state shot title as a senior at Jackson-Milton High. Leichtliter tossed the shot indoors 50-6, while Rossi had a 9:49 time for two miles and 4:35.3 for the mile indoors.

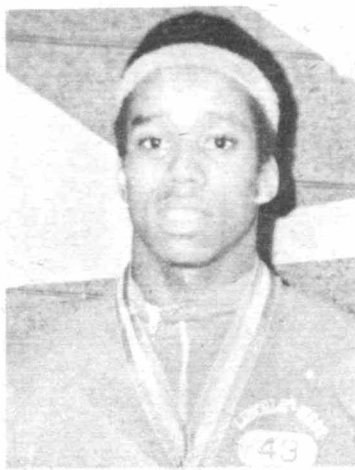

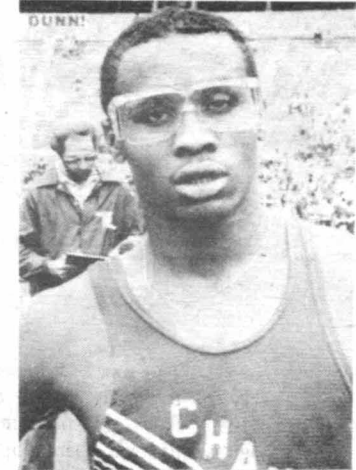

## Heights, Adams to Dominate

CLEVELAND — When it comes to talking track in the Cleveland area, you have to start with Cleveland Heights and John Adams, two teams which tied for the Ohio Class AAA championship last spring with 32 points in Columbus.

Heights' coach Dick Mann, in his 22nd year as boss of the Tigers, lost a number of standouts through graduation, but look for his team again to be strong, especially in big relays meets, where the Tigers are tough to hold.

Adams' coach Claude Holland, who usually does not have the depth that Heights has, has a number of top quality people, but a couple of athletes have eligibility problems and if they cannot compete, they will be sorely missed.

Front runners for Heights should be seniors Eric Butt and Derek Barney in the sprints and hurdles and senior Charles Williams and juniors Chuck Story and Ken Moss in the sprints.

Jeff Kellon, a 5-9 junior who high jumps 6-6 and junior Arturo Ingram, who has cleared 6-4, long jumper Kirk Steele, who was fourth in the state meet last spring (21-11½) and sophomore shot putter Dennis Driggins are among the best Tigers in the field.

Junior Rollie Hudson, the MVP of the Maple Heights indoor meet with victories in the 800 and 1600, Robert Grace and Mario Marshall are among the top open and relay middle distance Tigers. Hudson also has gone 6-2 in the high jump.

Adams' top sprinter is James Jackson and its top distance runner is Donnell Simon. The Rebels' 1600 relay quartet of Bernard Strong, Henry McKnight, Harold Maddox and Bill Jones set a Knights of Columbus indoor record of 3:27.37, but this foursome must stay intact in order to continue its record-wrecking in the outdoor season. Adams also won the K of C medley relay.

Among the top hurdlers in the area are Belfred Clark of John Marshall, Pat Walsh of St. Ignatius, Paul Pallante of Euclid and Mark Bongers of Westlake. Clark was second in the state in the highs (14.0) and fifth in the lows (36.0) last spring.

Lincoln-West coach Bump Taylor has another outstanding 1600 relay, including senior anchorman Dennis Felton, a 6-0, 170-pounder who will be strong in the open 400. Running with Felton on the relay are three juniors, Tim Gloer, Wendell

Cole and Derrek Leslie. Other promising Wolverines are 1600-meterman D.C. Sell, a move-in from West Virginia, and sophomore sprinter David Lopez.

In addition to Walsh in the hurdles and 400 and 1600 relays, St. Ignatius coach Chuck Kyle has outstanding 1600 and 3200 relay foursomes in Dan Brogan, Chris Smith, Mike Huber and Walsh in the former race and Smith, Mike Coyne, Tony Galang and Huber or Tom Maloney in the latter event.

Westlake coach Larry Nickel has junior Tom Barrett, the Southwestern Conferenc record-holder in the 300 low hurdles (38.0), shot putter Guy Reynolds, who goes 54-0, and Russ Miller and Brad Plaster, both 13-6 vaulters.

Senior Neil Rock of Brecksville will be a top performer in the shot and discus. Mentor should have another strong relays team, including Tony Tonti and Dan Bucey in the pole vault. Tonti has gone 13-8 indoors. Temmate Jeff Erskine should soar in the high jump.

Among the top distance men are Rocky River senior Bob Mau, defending state 3200 champion (9:11.44) and two-time state individual cross country winner, Steve Wargo of Midpark, Andy Herr of Berea, Jim O'Reilly and Steve Hamm of Lakewood.

Berea has speed in senior Rodney Whitlow, who was second in the 100 and third in the 200 in the state meet last year. Ron Hutchins gives Berea a strong threat in the 400.

Euclid, always strong in relays, has sprinter-hurdler Paul Pallante, sprinter Aubrey Ward, his sophomore brother Ray Ward and sprinter Paul McGraw as a strong nucleus along with weightman Greg Frondran, who should exceed 160-feet in the discus and 50-0 in the shot.

St. Joseph should be strong in the sprints with Al Wilks, Mike Clark, John Gist and Marshall Minnis.

Chagrin Falls has a standout senior distance ace in Andy Wiese, who won the state AA 1600.

Bedford Chanel returns defending state champ Kevin Henderson in the low hurdles and looks for winning efforts from Cecil Washington in the 400.

Long jumper Chris Bean of Lutheran East will try to repeat his Class A state meet victory as he heads this event in this area.

# DeVilbiss has Balance in City League Chase

TOLEDO — Field events and the 800-meter run are where you will find the class of the Toledo City League track and field stars this season.

With the exception of the pole vault, City League coaches are listing plenty of promise as the outdoor season unfolds. But if you are hunting for a favorite in the chase for the team title — well, maybe by mid-May the fog will have cleared.

"Most of the coaches feel that there is some very good talent, not much depth, but perhaps the best balance in some time," says Bud Tapola, coach of the defending City League champion DeVilbiss Tigers.

There is no way one can not include the Tigers in this year's run, but add to the list St. Francis, Bowsher, St. John's, and perhaps Rogers and Woodward. Scott and Libbey are considered outside bets.

No fewer than seven individuals are listed as potential 22-foot long jumpers, three of them from one team.

Mike Moss, second in the state last year at 22-3/4, Damon Hueston and Charles Strong, are Macomber's best bet for individual champions. Strong went 21 feet-plus as a sophomore and missed last year with a broken leg.

Bowsher's Ed Turner, perhaps the best high jumper in town with a 6-5 leap, and Ken Jones of Libbey have both gone over 21 feet already with DeVilbiss' Edwin Bracey and Mark Belcher close behind.

Rogers' Byron Scott won the City League shot put last year, returns as the favorite, and has an indoor put of 54-0. Mark down David Baker of St. John's, a 50-footer, John Townsend and Brian Waugh of St. Francis as the challengers.

DeVilbiss' Norman Todd was runnerup in the district last year and capable of a 160-foot throw, according to Tapola. Scott, second in the city a year ago, should be the top challenger.

Forget the pole vault, most City League athletes do.

Libbey's Todd Farrell and Charles Lutchev are two of the premier high hurdlers, but the City League's best for years to come may be at Scott in the person of freshman Lance Miller. Miller ran away from everyone last year in junior high. He also was impressive in AAU summer meets.

Rogers' Wayne Boyd finished third in the 55-yard dash at the OSU indoor meet and will be challenged by a pair of sub 11 sprinters in the 100 meters. Phil Thomas from Woodward turned a 10.8 last year, and DeVilbiss' Darrell Bell had a 10.9.

Start miler John Richards stamped himself as an early favorite in that event by running a 4:18 in the 1,500 indoors. Bowsher's Rick Nelson, and St. Francis freshman Brad Wotring must also be mentioned.

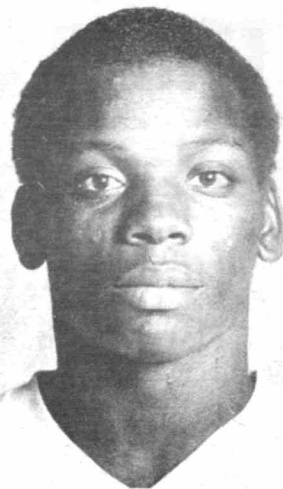
Libbey's Jones, Vince Croci of Central and Woodward's Kevin Bell top the list of returning threats in the low hurdles with Croci probably the strongest of the three.

Stanley Byard finished second in the district in the 400 last year and the Macomber senior lists a 49.8 as his best. DeVilbiss' Darrell Bell hasn't run the open 400 but has been time at 49.0 for a split in the 1600 relay where Start's Robert Highsmith has recorded a 48.6 and Reggie Truss of Bowsher 50.0.

Boyd, Woodward's Thomas, Bell and Ryan Huggins of DeVilbiss are all listed as 22-second candidates in the 200 and St. Francis' Bill Keeling and Bill Davis and Jesse Mondragon of Waite head the 3200 returnees.

Relay leaders include Rogers, St. Francis and Libbey in the 3200; Woodward, DeVilbiss, Rogers and St. Francis in the 400 and Start, DeVilbiss, Libbey, St. John's and Rogers in the 1600.

All that's left is the 800, perhaps the city's best single event DeVilbiss' Cliff Woodward won the district last year at 1:58.7, Rich Lishewski of St. Francis was timed at 1:56 on a leg of the 3200 relay and teammate MarkKozar, Matt Butler or Rogers, Aaron Larimore of Libbey and Gilbert Brown of Rogers are all sub two-minute performers.

LORAIN — The Buckeye, Lakeland, Erie Coast and Inland Conferences should snare and share in state-wide headlines as the track season heats up.

Fleet veteran football tailbacks Willie Clark of Sandusky and Jerry Dunlap of Lorain Admiral King again lead strong sprint and relay crews that paced Coach Jim Johnson's Blue Streaks and Houston Love's Admirals to respective finishes of 2-1 and 1-2 in 1981 and 1982 League meets.

Last spring, South Carolina U.-bound Dunlap and returning senior mate Derrick Nix were part of AK's Class AAA District record 3:22.8 and 43.2 quartets in the 1600M and 400M baton sorties.

Mark Patton (sprints), mammoth Pat Call (weights) and past state qualifier John Mincy (long jump) are other notables at deep King, unbeaten in 33 straight dual meets.

Clark, who piled up 25 points in last year's BC meet, is joined by other 10.9-type speedsters Rich Twine and Ricky McGee, plus strong junior weightman Tracy Steele and sophomore Curt Rogers, a distance dandy.

New Marion Harding coach Rich Huddle has a premier hurdler in senior vet Robert Pittman, as well as junior sprint hopeful Dave Jones, whose father starred on Big Ten cinders at Michigan U. Pittman led all indoor hurdle scoreboards this past winter.

Elyria's seasoned Jim Silver, 9th in the state AAA cross country meet, should shine in the distances, while Findlay coach John Didich could hit weight jackpots with big grid back Pat Dillon, a 170-0 discman.

Look for midview to have its best year ever in the Lakeland. Rangy Jeff Moore and husky Gary Lark-

ins can go 6-8 and 6-6 in the high jump, and fellow Middle John Etzle is defending AAA Regional discus ruler.

Junior sprinter-jumper-hurdler Larkins is touted as the best all-around athlete in MHS history, also scoring heavily in basketball and football.

Injury-hampered Peter Rivera, who set the alltime Lorain County 100-M mark with 10.7 as a soph last year, will test his powerful legs in major meets, but the Southview star has already brought the young Erie Coast loop a lift in prestige, much like Elyria Catholic has in cross country for the past decade.

Tested EC Panthers, whose running range is 400-through-3200, are No. 1 Brian Wolbers, Tim Meador, Jim Payne, Bob Stang, Dan Flanigan and Jim Kozma. Rival Lorain Catholic's ace is versatile Paul Santiago.

Firelands, a Class AA school like EC, finally put the little Inland circuit on the map by winning the 1982 Ohio medium-school harrier meet. Falcon runners back are seniors Doug Deshuk and Darren

Benedict and soph sensation Mike Beetler. Elyria West's Tom Zimmerman is an AA harrier transplant, too.

Hop-scooting East, Avon Lake's Andy Schillinger appears ready to challenge the best of AA A fields in the 400-M dash where he qualified for state with 49.8 last year at Amherst's oval.

Legendary veteran Dick Cooley has retired as Amherst coach but he'll remain as manager of the regional meet, among others. Dale Smith, 34, replaced Cooley and he'll emulate his predecessor with sundry distancemen leading the way.

Vermilion will host the 14th Lorain County Relays April 16. For the first time, Sandusky will have 15 instead of 12 teams in its 22d relays on April 30. Among the heavy-hitters not mentioned who will attend the Bay City Spikerama are Lancaster, Kent Roosevelt and Euclid.

A district meet site switch finds Rocky River replacing Elyria on May 20-21.

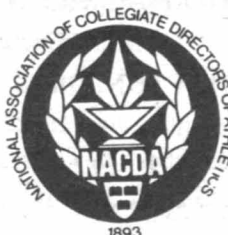

# Alliance Expected to Rule with Ace Sprinter Hawkins

CANTON — Alliance High track coach Dave Clegg has built the Flyer fortunes to lofty heights since he took over the reigns in the sport 13 years ago.

And the Flyer spikers are again expected to dominate the Stark County scene. Chief contenders to Alliance's supremacy include perennial Federal League champion GlenOak, Federal League challenger Jackson, Massillon and Timken.

One of the great sprinters in Alliance history was Anthony Blair, who went on to national prominence at the University of Tennessee. One season, with Blair winning most of the points, Alliance tied for the state championship in 1976.

Now Clegg, whose team was 6-0-1 in duals last season, has another sprinter in the Blair mold. He is sophomore Marzette Hawkins, whom Clegg says has the ability to duplicate or better the feats of the fabled Blair.

The swiftest sophomore in Ohio last season, Hawkins ran the 220 in 22.5 and the 400 meters in 50.6 last year. Clegg, who also coaches the cross country team at the school, lauds Hawkins as a super sophomore. He is 5-10 and 167 pounds.

Alliance will have another speed merchant in Troy Kirksey, who qualified for the 100-meter dash in the state last season and also ran on the 400-meter relay team.

Clegg has two outstanding distance runners in brothers Leonard and Lowell Terrell. Len, a senior, finished fourth in the state in the state AAA cross country meet, and Lowell, a junior, finished eighth.

Other top Alliance competitors include half-miler Jay Williams, junior long jumper Tyrone Franklin and Don Miller, shot and discus. Franklin had the best jump in Stark County last season with a leap of 22-8.

Clegg says Alliance will have good depth this season, and the schedule has been bolstered with the addition of Walsh Jesuit and Akron Buchtel to the schedule.

Jim Bollas is starting his eighth season at GlenOak and he has written a proud track chapter. Bollas has guided GlenOak to Federal League titles seven straight times. The Golden Eagles loom as strong contenders again.

One of GlenOak's foremost performers will be junior Dennis Knott, a fine distance runner who had some nagging leg problems last month. Knott's best time for the mile last season was 4:27 and 9:57 in the two-mile. He recently ran in a 3,000-meter race indoors and turned in a good time of 9:09.5.

GlenOak has an outstanding hurdler and long jumper in senior Carlos Alexander, but Bollas says that Alexander is undecided if he

will compete this season.

Injured last year, Greg James has returned and Bollas looks for bright things from him. As a sophomore two years ago, James set a record in the league in the low hurdles. Dave Grantier in the high jump and long jump should earn GlenOak points.

Bollas is working with two sprinters who could help. They are junior Rick Nunley, on the shelf last year after knee surgery, and senior Monte Crowl.

Jackson Coach Len Simonetti has three veteran spikers around whom he will build. They are tri-captains John Creighton, Rob Tyler and Kenneth Jones.

Creighton competes in the 440, high jump and long jump. Tyler runs the mile and 2-mile and recorded a 4:28 in the mile last year. Jones excels in the shot and discus, owning 49-5 and 154-0 efforts.

Simonetti is also looking for good things from sprinter Jay Todd, long jumper Ron Miller and distance runner John Shriver.

Coach Jim Stefancich of Timken, who took a bankrupt track program seven years ago and built the Trojan fortunes, has won 19 straight dual meets over a three-season span.

Dewon Turpin, who holds the school record in the high and low hurdles, was a district champion last season and is prepared this season to make a statewide bid.

Kevin Lane, MVP in cross country, John Miller and Bob Coverly also figure prominently in the Timken scenario. Coverly should be a threat in the pole vault. He had a vault of 12-0 recently.

Massillon, under Coach Jim Letcavits, is having a track resurgence. Two Tigers who have their orbs on statewide baubles are 245-pound Charles Calhoun, who put the shot 54-0 for fourth in the state finals last year, and Jim Bushe, a top hurdler. Bushe, also an excellent football player and wrestler, has a 14.7 in the highs and 37.6 in the lows.

Two other Massillon standouts are 265-pound Ty Beadle, shot and discus, and Curt Bodiford, in the 400 meters and low hurdles. Massillon has a fine mile relay foursome in Bodiford, Jim Geiser, George Ziegler and Marcell Stephens.

Coach Bruce Carter of McKinley has a top state threat in Dan Green, a swift senior who competes in the 100 and 400 meter dashes. In mid-March, Green ran 49.9 in the 400 indoors.

McKinley has another top threat in husky Vic Parks, who put the shot 53-0 indoors. Marvin Smith, a snior, looks good in the 800.

McKinley's mile relay team of Warren Carter, John Warner, Garland Rivers and Green also must be reckoned with.

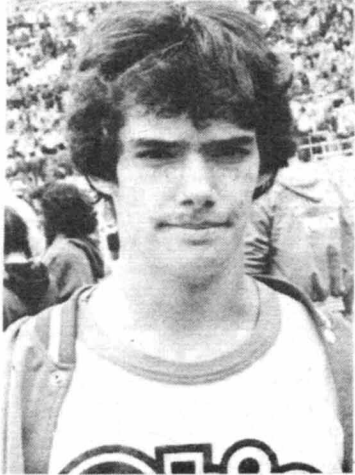

COLUMBUS - Cincinnati Elder and Upper Arlington won AAA titles in contrasting styles — Elder in a relative breeze and Arlington in tight squeeze — at the Ohio High School Athletic Association state cross country championships here Oct. 30.

Elder, making its 17th straight state meet appearance won its first boys' crown since 1972 by coasting home with 105 points. Arlington retained the girls' title, 50-51, over Lima Shawnee. For the first time the meet was held over a 5,000-meter course on Ohio State's Scarlet and Gray Golf Course on a cool, foggy day.

Elder led a 1-2-3 sweep for Southwestern Ohio as Fairborn was second with 129 points and Kettering Fairmont East third with 164. Both are from the Dayton area.

In dethroning two-time AAA champ Kent Roosevelt, which finished seventh, Elder was paced by Tom Thompson (15:29), Rick Merk (15:38), Mike Quatman (16:02), Tim Schenkel (16:05) and Jim Maurmeier (16:18).

"I thought we could win it," said Coach Steve Spencer who watched his team run its best times of the year. Elder suffered a near-disasterous loss in the district a week previously to Fairborn and Kettering East, but made amends in the state meet.

Firelands won its first AA crown with 121 points and McDonald bagged the Class A title with 91 points.

Minster, a perennial Class A girls' track powerhouse, served notice it will have to be reckoned with in cross country. The school's program is only two years old, but it already produced its first state cross country championship when Coach Katie Horstman's girls outran favored Zanesville Rosecrans, 61-66.

Suzie Deters paced Minster with a second place finish in the team race with 19:08 as Rosecrans' Susan Nash was first in 18:34. Patty Metzler of Jackson-Milton won her third

## Martin and Kirkham in record-breaking form

Lavonna Martin of Northwestern Track Club in Trotwood, O., broke an alltime Ohio indoor girls record in the 60-yard hurdles at the Indiana TAC meet Feb. 12 at Indiana University.

Lavonna's time was 8.10 FAT for the 30-inch hurdles which broke the Ohio record by .3 formerly held by Marie Henry of Kettering Striders in 1970.

Martin also ran a 36.4 in the 300-yard dash, posting her second best ever time for that distance. She just missed her own record by one-tenth of a second.

Dawn DeHart of Cincinnati Loveland broke the girls alltime Ohio indoor shot put record on throws of 41-3¾, 42-4¼ and 43-8 to add an amazing two feet, 8¾ inches to Theresa Hawkins' old 1980 record.

However, DeHart's alltime Ohio record didn't last long because on March 21 at Ohio State, Cindy Peaks of Columbus West claimed the alltime mark with a put of 44-7 at the Central District Indoor Meet in French Fieldhouse on the OSU campus.
